

There are huge variations in visual function depending on an individual's eye condition and their own experience.


Only a tiny proportion of the Australian population - and clients of Guide Dogs – have total vision loss, *Low Vision* is far more common.




Definitions


- Low vision: permanent vision loss that cannot be corrected with spectacles and glasses and impacts on daily function.
- **Legal blindness:** a person who cannot see at 6 metres what a normally sighted person can see at 60 metres or has a field of vision restricted to 20 degrees diameter or less, or a combination of both.
 - Eligible for special benefits and services
- Total vision loss: severe vision loss- with or without light perception
- Functional vision: functional vision refers to how well a person performs while interacting with the visual environment. How they use their vision in everyday activities.

Approximate example of Legal Blindness




Examples of functional vision loss







Examples of functional vision loss







Additional disabilities or health considerations?

Considered in their impact on daily function in addition to vision loss or blindness but main objective is to provide support for people experiencing issues in daily life due to vision loss and blindness.


