Introduction

Purpose

Chapter 3 of the *Local Government Act 1993* (NSW) establishes the principles for Council when exercising its functions and decision-making to consider sound financial management, investment in responsible and sustainable infrastructure, principles of ecologically sustainable development and social justice principles.

Council embraces these principles and actively seeks to build on these principles where it can, and these are formalised in this document as a policy of Council.

Scope

This policy applies to anyone conducting or participating in Council procurement activities.

Policy statement

The policy will ensure Councils procurement activities are in accordance with best practice, and comply with legislative and contractual requirements contributing to Council's economic, social, governance and environmental sustainability.

Principles

In conducting its procurement activities, Council will:

- comply with the *Local Government Act 1993* (NSW), the Local Government (General) Regulation 2021 (NSW) and all other relevant legislation
- conduct business in a manner which models best-practice governance, probity and public interest disclosure requirements
- when using its own contract templates for procurements, ensure that those templates
 contain terms and conditions that strike a balance between being fair and compliant with
 relevant unfair contract laws whilst also protecting the legitimate interests of Council
- seek to work with individuals and organisations that demonstrate ethical conduct and practices including compliance with *Modern Slavery Act 2018* (NSW) provisions
- consider the impacts of its decisions on:
 - the people the health and wellbeing of our people (staff, contractors and the public) are of paramount importance
 - the environment our community values the long-term wellbeing and unique character of Lake Macquarie City's built and natural environment by Council taking these considerations into account to ensure sustainable procurement which reduces environmental impacts
 - the economy the growth and diversification of our local economy is vital to the longterm prosperity of Lake Macquarie City and where possible gives preference to sourcing from Local suppliers providing there is no burden or increase to overall cost

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- the community procurement activities need to be consistent with the social fabric of the Lake Macquarie community and should seek to support Lake Macquarie City's community values and where possible gives consideration to sourcing from Indigenous and Recognised Social Enterprise businesses
- strive to deliver best value, considering whole of life costs
- use a risk-based approach to guide its procurement decisions, and promote a culture of continuous learning to improve procurement practices across Council.

Objectives

The objective of this policy is to communicate Council's commitment to managing its procurement practices in a manner that complies with relevant legislation and delivers the very best achievable outcomes for Lake Macquarie City and its people. This means that, beyond achieving quality and cost effectiveness for all goods and services procured, Council will objectively seek the most positive sustainability outcomes possible across the entire life cycle of the goods or services procured.

Review and Evaluation

This policy will be reviewed every four years unless required sooner.
